

Leicester Students' Union Awards A Guide to writing a good Nomination

STUDENTS'

The Do's and Dont's

DO

Be concise and clear – we don't need an essay, just a few sentences will do!

DO

Give reasons why you think the person deserves the award – giving specifics will always help (like what projects they've done, what successes they've achieved or the impact they've had)!

DO

Remember the basics (punctuation, capital letters and spelling) - though we aren't judging the nomination itself, it's always easier to understand if the basics are done right!

DON'T 🔀

Just say the person is amazing – even though we love to hear how great our student leaders are, the judges won't know all the amazing things the nominee has done and it won't meet the shortlisting criteria

DON'T 🔀

Write the same thing as other people putting forward a nomination – we don't consider the number of nominations when shortlisting (so don't just get your friends to copy and paste the same nomination!)
